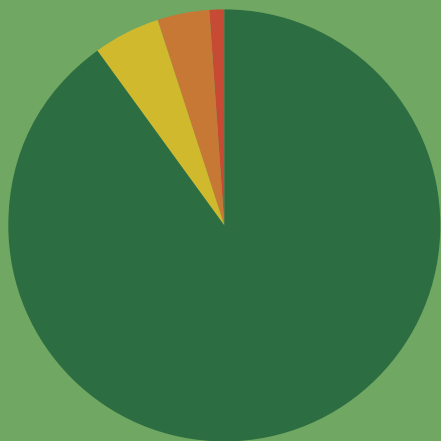
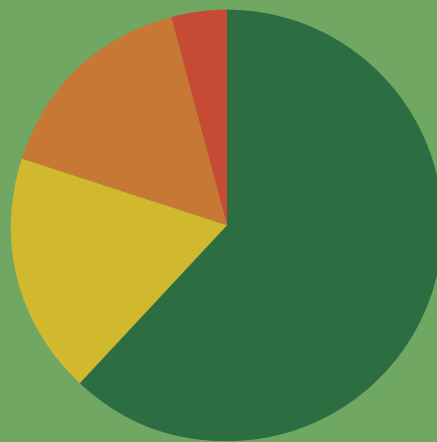

Ignite the Spark Challenge

At Bennington, 98% of students receive financial aid (both merit- and need-based) with an average award package of \$56,162. More than 60% of those students rely specifically on need-based aid, which means your generosity has a direct and immediate impact on their ability to access a Bennington education.

In recognition of the College's commitment to expanding scholarship support, **Chair of the Board Nick Stephens '77** and **Trustee Mary Bucksbaum Scanlan '91** launched the **Ignite the Spark Challenge** last year. The Challenge is a dollar-for-dollar match created to amplify the impact of every donor gift. Thanks to their leadership and the generosity of donors making new and sustained commitments, this initiative expands scholarship opportunities, strengthens Bennington's academic excellence, and helps ensure the College remains accessible to all.

“I’ve always seen my path as entrepreneurial. Bennington taught me that. It wasn’t about staying in your lane—it was about understanding that there are no lanes.”

“Let’s do it.” That’s Katrina Leestma’s signature phrase—and how she lives: with conviction, energy, and purpose.

Katrina came to Bennington in the mid-1980s from a small city near Chicago, encouraged by a high school friend, Lincoln Shatz '86, who was already a student. She credits Bennington with shaping her life. “There’s just no culture like Bennington,” she says. “It gives you this freaking gumption.”

It also guided a career of rich, interdisciplinary work from printmaking to teaching mental health nursing. “I’ve always seen my path as entrepreneurial,” she explains. “Bennington taught me that. It wasn’t about staying in your lane—it was about understanding that there are no lanes.”

Bennington wasn’t just where she studied—it’s where she became. “I would not be the person I am without that education. It’s not just me who’s benefited—it’s everyone I’ve worked with. That’s the ripple effect.”

Now, Katrina is creating a new ripple—by giving back. While attending a Bennington graduation for close friend and classmate Carol C. Stark-Osornio '85’s daughter Lily in 2025, she felt the magic again. “It’s still there. It’s still Bennington.” Inspired by alum, friend, and trustee Ciaran Cooper '87, she walked into the Institutional Advancement office and said, “I want to make a gift.” She joined the “Ignite the Spark” scholarship campaign, during which gifts are double matched, in honor of her parents.

For Katrina, giving isn’t charity—it’s transformation. “Nobody tells you the magic that happens inside the giver when it’s personal. It’s life-affirming.”

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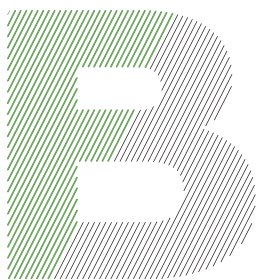
Sigrid Burton '73 is one such alumna who shares her reasons for making a planned gift commitment.

During a particularly serendipitous Non-Residential Term, she began working as a studio assistant for Helen Frankenthaler '49—an experience that led to a full-time role after graduation. Following two years with Frankenthaler, Burton worked for a year as an assistant to Jules Olitski. Collectively, these formative experiences deeply influenced her artistic development—something she continues to see as a lasting benefit of her Bennington education.

Rosalind “Roz” Bernheimer '62 says, “Bennington sets itself up to be about the individual, but it’s really about the connections.”

Roz met her husband Wally in Booth House living room and Dr. Joseph Lord at Boston Children’s Psychiatry Department during Non-Resident Term (now Field Work Term). Her NRT opened professional doors she never imagined. When Roz applied for a job at the Massachusetts Department of Mental Health as a graduate, Dr. Lord’s recommendation sealed it.

“I got to do things I never could have done,” she said. “That was because of Bennington. I never would have called Boston Children’s to get a job. I never would have had to do it or thought to do it.”

After graduation, she joined the Boston alumni group, served on the Board during challenging years, and, inspired by the opening of a snack bar when she was a student, gave a transformative donation to name the current *Roz’s Café*.

Roz continues to give consistently, as she has for more than 50 years. Her generosity is reflected in her membership in the Commons Society for her consistent support and in the 1932 Circle for her leadership giving, which drives transformative impact across the College. Because she included Bennington generously in her estate plans, she is a Silo Legacy Society member. Finally, Roz has given to major construction projects and to the Bennington Fund, the source of the College’s scholarships and crucial operating support. Her granddaughter, Xia, is now a third year Bennington student.

The Helen Frankenthaler Foundation

The Helen Frankenthaler Foundation, established by and named for the renowned American artist who spent her formative years at Bennington (Class of 1949 as well as a Trustee from 1967 to 1982), is among the College's leading benefactors.

Bennington helped mold Helen Frankenthaler into a creative powerhouse who helped define Abstract Expressionism in America and Color Field Theory. Her legacy is a living, breathing testament to her vision—one that helps shape a Bennington education every single day.

The foundation's connection to Bennington goes beyond philanthropy. They are active participants in the Museum Fellows Term, which gives Bennington undergraduates the unique opportunity to do semester-long internships in art organizations in New York City. They also loan several of Frankenthaler's artworks to the College for display and educational purposes.

In just the past year, Bennington has received a \$150,000 grant from the Foundation for the Frankenthaler-Stickney Scholarship, originally launched by Helen herself in her lifetime. This scholarship, which also bears the name of Rebecca Stickney, a beloved Bennington staff member of over 40 years, supports one

student in the visual arts and another in the sciences and mathematics. Additionally, in June 2025, the Foundation made an unsolicited grant of \$10,000 to the College in consideration of the nationwide loss of federal arts funding, which has impacted Bennington and many other institutions. (In March 2025, the National Endowment for the Arts withdrew a \$10,000 grant offer to the *Bennington Review* literary journal.)

The Foundation has also continued to support the Creative Legacy Fellows (a Field Work Term fellowship) as well as the Museum Fellows Term (MFT). Students in MFT meet with the Foundation several times during the semester, and the Foundation's inaugural Manager of Education, Rachael Pullin, even accompanied the Frankenthaler Fellows on a trip to the Venice Biennale in 2024. The Foundation has recently added a webpage devoted solely to its deep and longstanding relationship with Bennington College.
